
WE had 10 Garden Club Members to attend the SAR (South Atlantic Region)



## "Hurray! Summer is Here!"

Summer is here and with it comes vacations whether trips take you to the mountains, big cities or where they may.

Right now, in my mind, it travels to the coast and walks on the beach, people watching and bird watching. I love the watch the American Oystercatchers, Royal Tern and Black Skimmer nesting and skimmering along the beach and ocean at the south end of Wrightsville Beach Island.

There are a number of ways to get involved with Audubon North Carolina on the Coast. You can join the local Cape Fear Audubon Chapter or you can volunteer with the Wrightsville Beach Stewards, a volunteer crew that educates visitors about beach-nesting birds on the south end of Wrightsville Beach.

Why should you not feed the gulls at the beach? Feeding birds can lead to an unnaturally higher number of gulls or crows, which are species that prey on other birds' young and eggs, including Piping Plovers, Black Skimmers, and terns. It can also create behavioral problems in the birds, which can lose their fear of humans and become aggressive.

Most birds that nest in beach habitats nest directly on the sand. They make a simple bowl-like depression called a "scrape" which serves as their nest. Because surface temperatures can often excel 100F, they spend much of their time shading eggs and young chicks, making them vulnerable to human disturbance. Nesting areas are roped off during the breeding season (usually April through August) in order to create a safe buffer between hard-working bird parents and sources of disturbances.

When a threat (such as humans or dogs) is too close, adult birds take flight to mob the perceived attacker or to flee the danger. This leaves eggs and chicks unprotected and vulnerable on many fronts. Being left unshaded by a parent for even a short time can cause temperature stress that kills eggs or chicks, and without a parent nearby, predators like gulls and crows can swoop in. Of course, direct harm is also possible, such as people stepping on well-camouflaged eggs or chicks, or dogs chasing adults or chicks. Finally, chronic disturbance from human recreation or other sources can cause parent birds to abandon eggs or chicks. Protecting nesting areas provides birds with safe habitat to nest in and offer opportunities for people to view wildlife at the beach!

I speak of only one place. You will find this wherever you travel. We have to look after our wildlife so that we can enjoy it and future generations can enjoy it.

I hope that you all will have a pleasant, peaceful, safe summer!!

**Environmental Education – : Eating to Save the Environment**

This summer's off- the-charts extreme heat wave in the Southwest, and recent rain bombs in south Florida have made us acutely aware that our weather is greatly affected by our carbon footprint. In recent years we have seen an increasing number of articles written about greenhouse gases and how CO2 is affecting climate change.

I am always looking for new sources of information to share with you, and this week's *Wall Street Journal* printed two articles that I found noteworthy. The first, by Eric Niller, discussed the probability of future cut backs in food choices made necessary by the reduction of farmland needed to raise crops and livestock. Farmers are facing serious pressure to reduce their carbon footprint while still meeting consumer demands.

Scientists are now able to compute the amount of greenhouse gases emitted to produce each food source. Sadly, cows are the biggest environmental offenders, emitting 72.75 pounds of carbon into the atmosphere for *each* pound of beef produced! In contrast, the production of eggs creates 8.25 pounds. Scientists at Tulane and the University of Michigan are now studying alternative food choices that are rich in protein and have less impact on the environment. They are predicting fewer cornfields, pig pens and cow pastures in our future. Niller's article proposed several alternate high protein options. A. <u>Mushrooms</u>: Commercially grown mushrooms don't require much land, and are in fact raised indoors using a fraction of the water needed to raise fruits and vegetables on land. B. <u>Lentils</u>: (peanuts/beans) are very rich in protein and can help reduce the need for livestock. Lentils can be grown in a variety of climates and soil types and don't require nitrogen fertilizers or large amounts of water. C. <u>Oysters</u>: are a plus-plus option for a source of protein and environmental protection. They can filter in excess of 50 gallons of water a day, providing a healthy ecosystem for sea grasses that absorb carbon dioxide from the atmosphere . D. I am not going to share with you Niller's suggestions about edible insects! Ugh!

The second article this week in WSJ about environmental issues was about the impact that over- zealous washing of our clothes has on the environment. Consumers are not educated about how to take care of clothing, and that is why companies invariably include "dry clean only" tags on most clothing. As an interior design major I was required to take courses in textile chemistry and textile testing for my degree and I learned that dry cleaning of fabrics can be reduced more than half, just by occasional spot cleaning and air drying. It is worth checking out an alternative product (RetroClean.com). Not included in this article was the fact that overwashing of fabrics is putting microscopic pieces of synthetics into our drinking water and oceans where they end up in our seafood. The real eye opener of this article was the use of a fine mist of <u>vodka</u> for freshening up clothing. This jewel of information came from a video claiming that the Dutch National Opera and Ballet Company use this method to freshen up costumes between performances! Vodka gently kills odor causing bacteria. Who Knew? You too can help!





She appreciated actually getting to meet people who cared about her education and the fact that she is "putting herself through school". Ashleigh expressed a desire to learn more about garden clubs and how to become a member in the future.

All of us can be proud of the scholarship support that SAR provides for students such as Ashleigh Mann. If your state is fortunate enough to have an SAR Scholarship recipient, invite the student to your state convention to meet and greet those who provide scholarship funding. There is no doubt that the result of such exposure to garden clubs will be worthwhile to our programs, with an added boost to garden club scholarships at all levels.

**ABOUT THE SCHOLARSHIP:** This scholarship is open to a college sophomore or junior for use during the junior or senior year of college. Each state garden club organization within the South Atlantic Region (Kentucky, North Carolina, South Carolina, Virginia and West Virginia) may submit one application to be in competition for the scholarship. A qualified student is one who is majoring in the study of Horticulture, Floriculture, Landscape Design, Botany, Plant Pathology, Biology, Forestry, Agronomy, Environmental Concerns, City Planning, Land Management and/or allied subjects. The scholarship amount (\$1,000 or \$2,000) will be determined by the SAR Board of Directors, and the recipient will be announced at the SAR annual convention in March.

<u>APPLICATION PROCEDURE</u>: The SAR Scholarship Application Form is the same as for National Garden Club Scholarships. Go to <u>www.gardenclub.org/collegescholarships</u>. Follow instructions to complete the application and send with all its components to your Garden Club STATE SCHOLARSHIP Chairman. Completed applications **must be received by the respective state SCHOLARSHIP CHAIRMAN BY FEBRUARY 1. EACH STATE'S best application must come to the REGIONAL SCHOLARSHIP CHAIRMAN BY MARCH 1.**

Academic Record	40%
Need	30%
Character	10%
Commitment to Career	15%
Variety of Avocation	5%

If the recipient maintains a "B" average, he/she may reapply each year during their college career.




