



My article for this issue of Key Notes, South Atlantic Region Garden Clubs, inc. relates to a summer program I presented this summer at the Mountwood Park Youth Adventure on Entomology! The ages of the campers were 9-11. The camp was 9am-12noon, Monday through Friday July 22-26. In building my presentation I ordered some very nice Vintage School Charts on Bees and Honey, The Beekeepers Guide to Pollinating Honey Plants; Entomology Dictionnaire Illustre; Insects Vol. 1, Beneficial Insects; Insects Vol. II; Insects Vol. III; Bugs and Insects, *Histoire Naturelle*; and Bees and Honey, More Specific to the Hive. The campers loved the charts and were impressed by all the ones they bugs and insects they recognized.

We discussed protecting insects to protect birds. We talked about butterflies and host plants. We talked about the many cicadas, not necessarily in our backyards but in several areas across the United States and with the emergence of two broods simultaneously. We had graham crackers with honey using a wooden spoon. They learned honey has live enzymes and if it comes in contact with a metal spoon, these enzymes die. Honey has a substance in it that helps the brain work better. Honey is one of the few foods on earth that alone can sustain life. A teaspoon of honey is enough to keep a man alive for 24 hours. Propolis produced by bees is one of the most powerful natural antibiotics. They also learned that honey has no expiration date. A bee lives less than 40 days, visits at least 1000 flowers and produces less than a teaspoon of honey, but for her it is the work of a lifetime.

Other things learned included that Dandelions are a key source of <u>early</u> nectar to Pollinators. They learned Lights Out for birds migrating Sept 6 – Oct 6. Light pollution can cause birds to become confused. Campers were all interested in learning about Yellow Stripey Things, carpenter bees, honey bees, bumblebees, hover-flies, paper wasps, yellow jackets, cicada killers and dirt daubers.

Campers really participated in all the discussions, especially adding commentary regarding their own dealings with bugs, bees, and more! I would encourage all of you to look for opportunities to teach our youth about Entomology and the study of insects. It is rewarding to see the youth really enjoying the subject and how we each can promote education of these most worthy bugs!

Grassroots Green: 'In Vino Veritas'

Now that the Fall harvest season is once again upon us, I wanted to share with you the interesting article I recently discovered, describing the unique way solar technology is being used in agriculture.

It seems that clever wine makers in France have installed solar panels elevated over their vineyards where they are growing grapes for Chardonnay wine. The panels collect solar energy that can then be used to help run needed mechanical equipment in the wine making process... but vintners have also discovered an amazing, unexpected benefit. The solar panels have provided just enough shade, in these recent summers of extreme heat in Europe, to prevent the grapes from drying out, thus making the finished Chardonnay wines sweeter.

To sweeten the experiment even further, vintners have benefitted from the added advantages of getting double use out of the same land, a return on their investment for installing the panels, and additional income by selling any un-used extra energy to electrical companies. This is a win-win scenario for all involved.

Just think of all the ways this idea can be used in areas of the world where the sun is plentiful and productive farmland is limited.

Now ... Sharing with you a bit of 'Environmental Irony'. This was sent to me as an email from a friend, without any reference to the original author. Good for a laugh!

"... So let me get this straight - I go to the grocery store to pick up a few things. I buy a pound of sliced ham at the deli counter, and it is handed to me wrapped in a plastic zip lock bag. I pick up a loaf of bread in a plastic bag, a gallon of milk in a plastic jug, a pack of napkins wrapped in plastic, a pound of potato salad in a plastic container, a bottle of mustard in a plastic squeeze bottle... and then, at the check-out counter they won't give me a plastic bag to carry my purchases home in... because the plastic bag is "bad for the environment"!

There is something for everyone, whether it be Zoom, Hybrid or in-person schools.


Take this opportunity to gain experience and grow, share with your clubs and community.

NATURAL DISASTERS 2024

Disasters, National & International

There were tornadoes over Texas and Louisiana on May 6 through May 9, 2024 that caused one billion dollars in destruction and damage. It was the second most devastating and deadly storms in twenty years.

Twenty-three states between South Dakota and Florida had at least one tornado in May of 2024. In Greenfield, Iowa an EF4 tornado killed 5 people making it the deadliest tornado in 2024 and a tornado destroyed most of Barnsdall and Bartlesville Oklahoma.

In May, the National Weather Service received 6100 severe weather reports including 475 tornadoes which is the most reported since May 2011.

On May 21, 2024, the deadliest single tornado was in Greenfield Ohio. The EF-4 tornado caused widespread destruction and five fatalities.

At least 10 people died in flooding and landslides across Himalayan regions of India on June 13, 2024 and severe downpours also left 2400 tourists stranded in the northeastern Indian state of Sikkim.

Six people died in India's Sikkim state and another four died from a landslide in neighboring Nepal's Kochi province according to officials.

As of September a total of 6332 wildfires have burned a cumulative 995,900 acres year to date. The number of wildfires and acres burned are higher than the 5 year average. Wildfires have destroyed 1,433 structures and killed one person in the state in 2024 in the state of California.

Hurricane Debby developed in August of 2024 as a category one hurricane in Florida and it created several EF1 tornados. This hurricane traveled through Florida through the mid Atlantic ending in New York which caused more than ten inches of rain New York State. The largest rain totals from this storm was 22.02 inches near Moncks Corner, South Carolina where an EF1 tornado caused horrific flooding to this area. Seven tornadoes were spawned in the Lowcountry of South Carolina on the night of August 5th, an EF1 tornado in Edisto Beach and another EF1 twister in Moncks Corner.

At the peak of the storm there were over 300,000 customers who were without power from Florida to the Carolinas for many days.

\PENNY PINES IS NOW PLANT-A-TREE

With NGC's signing of a new memorandum with the National Forest Service, major changes have come to the Penny Pines project.

First change: New Name

The Penny Pines name has been replaced with the title PLANT-A-TREE. The focus of sustaining our national forests by helping with reforestation remains the same. NGC feels the new name "better reflects the program's mission and will help reach a wider audience."

Second change: Amount of Donation

Donations are no longer required to be \$68.00 or multiples of \$68.00. Donations may be in any amount from \$50 to \$10,000. The minimum donation is \$50.00.

Third change: Designation where the donation is sent

Previously, donors had the option to designate a state or a specific National Forest to which the donation would be used. While donors may still designate a specific National Forest, they instead are encouraged to select the option that allows the donation to go to "where it is most needed."

NGC reminds us that the Forest Service reserves the right to utilize funds based on need. If the donor chooses a forest where no tree planting is needed, the funds may be used for planting in another forest.

Fourth change; Certificates

After May 31, 2025, NGC will no longer mail certificates and will move to a digital format.

(More on this change in a later newsletter.) For now, a donor may continue to request a certificate which NGC Headquarters will prepare and mail.

Fifth change: New Plant-A-Tree Donation Form

A Word from the SAR Scholarship Chairman


