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

2025 SAR Director's Report

Greetings to all of you who have come together for this 63rd Annual SAR Convention! It seems like forever ago, and yet like yesterday, since our last convention in Greenville, SC. This convention here in Raleigh, too, is a lovely venue for us to meet up with friends and make new ones. Many thanks go to Ms. Frances Cain and Ms. Marilyn Wright, President Linda McLendon, their 'Dream Team', and all the other NC Club Members for providing the good times and memories we have shared while here. Yesterday's tour and reception at the JC Raulston Arboretum was one of those that will forever be remembered! Beautiful music, stories, food, meeting new friends…what a memorable time while wearing a lovely wrist corsage!

Since our last SAR Convention in Greenville, SC, I co-chaired our GCKY Convention three weeks later. We have a sweet group of officers and other club members that make work easier! Still, it was a welcome retreat for me to head to the WV Convention a little over a week later. They told me the first night was a fun time with a theme and for me to join in. My biggest stress was trying to find me an outfit suitable for the evening's fun time theme of Hee Haw! I am so glad I rounded one up, because I had a great time with the WV crew! A few days later, I headed down to SC where southern hospitality abounded. The afternoon reception was in their enchanting Memorial Garden, eating freshly picked, sweet strawberries and whipped cream...how could I forget that? A month later I was at the VA Convention, getting to enjoy all the excitement that included a flower show!

Much planning goes into each convention and most members are not fully aware of the time and effort that it takes to make an event that is enjoyable and educational at the same time. I thank all of our sister states for welcoming me.

My theme has been Go Green-Plant Natives! It is important for us to use native plants in our yards, gardens, and encourage our states to plant the roadside medians. About a third of our food results from natural pollination. This cannot occur if our little pollinators such as birds, insects, butterflies, bats, and furry critters don't have enough food to sustain them. My special projects have been to create a wildlife habitat and create a community native plant garden. These projects are so important because new home developments, businesses, shopping malls, and roads are taking away the natural habitats.

In order to help our pollinators survive and thrive, we need to make sure they have a wildlife habitat that provides them with food, shelter, water, and a place to raise or feed their young. It should contain native plants and shrubs that will provide food all year round. No pesticides, herbicides, or fungicides should be used. Encourage your garden club to create a wildlife habitat in your community. Start small and keep adding to it or create other small wildlife habitats

Members can plant native plants, shrubs, and trees in their yards, and this is beneficial to the little pollinators passing through. To make a bigger impact, your club can create a community native plant garden where a variety of different natives can be planted. When a native shrub or tree is included, you have provided a potential shelter for caterpillars, birds, and wildlife. Many modern hybrid flowers are bred for color-pretty but may not be beneficial to pollinators. We heard last evening from both Brenda Moore and David Johnson of the importance of planting natives and other beneficial plants and not keeping the perfect lawn.

We, as gardeners, teach by example and by promoting education. People notice when we are out working in our public gardens and promoting good stewardship of our earth. We do make a difference in our communities. Planting natives sends a message that gardens exist for more than just beauty. They are vital to pollinators and wildlife survival.

The byline for my theme has been 'And Plant Seeds for New Clubs'. Growing membership is vital to the survival of our gardening organization which is the largest volunteer gardening organization in the world. In the 1960's there were more than 425,000 members in our national organization. Today we have much less than half of that number. Fortunately, we are seeing an increase. Many of the younger generation are concerned about what they put in their bodies and see the importance of outdoor activities. This is a good change. We need to promote garden clubs among this group. They may not want to attend a convention but would prefer to Zoom. For our important work to continue, we must adapt to reel them in as active members. They may gradually see why meeting in person at a gathering such as a convention, is actually enjoyable and productive.

When you ask people to come to garden club, many will say 'but I kill all plants'. Just answer with a smile that garden club is definitely where they need to belong. Tell them, belonging to a federated garden club has so much so offer. Didn't Brenda give us '50 Shades of Green' last evening? Remember, we are about education! There is a niche for everyone, even if they don't grow a single plant! We just need to be aggressive and diligent in inviting potential members and encouraging the formation of new clubs. And I heard yesterday morning that SC is on an upward march with new clubs forming and old ones finally federating. Please share with all of us what is being done in SC.

Let's not forget that we are an all-volunteer organization. We are here because we want to be a part of something that promotes goodness, and we want to have a fun time doing it!

Greetings from the Bluegrass State, The Commonwealth of Kentucky. In the last year, Kentucky has weathered many storms with the help of of our members. The Garden Club or Kentucky, Inc. has reached out to our communities through the Natural Disaster Re-Leaf Fund which was the brain child of then president, Carcille Burchette. Along with the Natural Disaster Grant from NGC, our friends in Mayfield, Kentucky continue to receive financial assistance after a devastating tornado hit December 10, 2021. This Spring brought flooding to our state and we stood ready to help our neighbors with assistance.

The GCKY officers, known as "The Pack" by our club members traveled to Raleigh for the South Atlantic Region meeting. It was perfectly presented and hosted by our friends in North Carolina. The food was great, the accommodations were lovely and we enjoyed the speakers and special programs presented. Kentucky celebrates Linda Howell as incoming SAR Director and proudly thanks Carcille Burchette for her commitment and service as Director 2023-2025.

The President's Special Projects during my term were the Blue Star Markers and Blue Bird Trails. One Gold Star Byway, one Gold Star Memorial Marker and six Blue Star Markers have been ordered for Kentucky in the last two years. One Blue Bird Trail was established and I've given many programs to clubs while distributing several hundred Blue Bird houses (thank you to my husband, Robert for his patience and help in building the houses). I also say "I have the vision, my husband helps make the vision a reality." These President's Special Projects were established with the future in mind to honor our military and promote conservation. Kentucky is fortunate to have our own state headquarters located at Paris, Kentucky in a beautiful historic home. We obtained a grant from the Historic Trust of Historic Preservation and are working with an architect to continue the preservation of The Wallis house which was built about 1850 and is on the National Register of Historic Places. The property also features a Level One Arboretum and is open to the public. GCKY continues to grow and several new clubs have joined and established clubs added membership. As all of us know, Spring brings the excitement of planning and planting and the interest in Garden Clubs spreads. Boone County Garden Club received a coveted Plant America Grant this year and we encourage our clubs to take advantage of those opportunities to improve their communities. As we begin a new administration and our clubs begin a new year starting in May, I urge members of SAR to encourage your local clubs to apply for each of these awards.

They are not difficult and the rewards of having planned and accomplished a simple project goes well beyond just the financial reward.

There is a feeling of accomplishment and pride that even our smallest clubs can achieve by helping save our beautiful world.

Right now I will remind you that Earth Day is coming up on April 21st and this would be the perfect time to get your club to do a one day project that could qualify for one of these four awards.

As the simplest of examples: All those plastic bottle caps from bottled water, and colas don't usually qualify for most recycling numbers... but they can be 'recycled' by using them as 'feet' under your terra cotta flowerpots, or using them to stop up the hole in the bottom of your flower pot.

If someone in your house drinks beer, then the aluminum bottle caps can also be used for the same purpose, instead of buying those expensive terra cotta "pot feet' at the garden center.

There are so many ways each of us can do tiny little things that will make a difference.

A more effective way to help is to not just turn off ..but UNPLUG appliances when you are not at home. One if the worst offenders is our computers. Many people leave them on 24/7. By unplugging them at night you can save energy any save yourself about \$100.00 a year also unplug cable boxes and countertop appliances.

I would love to hear from you about your ideas for helping save the environment. I promise I will share them with our members.

I will leave you with the quote from Gaylord Nelson that continues to inspire me: "The ultimate test of our conscience is our willingness to sacrifice something todayfor the sake of future generations...whose words of thanks we will not hear."



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During 2024, Penny Pines underwent a name change with the signing of a new memorandum between National Garden Clubs and the U.S. Forest Department. The new name is Plant-A-Tree. The focus of sustaining our national forests by helping with reforestation remains the same but besides a new name, there are other changes.

Donation amounts may be in any amount from \$50.00 up to \$10,000.

Donors may designate a specific National Forest where the donation will be used. However, the Forest Service reserves the right to utilize the donation where it is most needed.

After May 31, NGC Headquarters will no longer mail a Plant-A-Tree certificate but will provide information on how the donor may create a certificate.

During the first year of this administration, \$12,104 was contributed to the Penny Pines project from four of our five SAR states.

For the second year of the administration \$ 11,961.50 was contributed and all SAR states participated.

Our donations total an impressive \$24,065.50 for two years.

Funds donated to the Plant-A-Tree Pines project by each state during calendar year 2024 are:



Three applications for the 2025 Corrie Whitlock Scholarship were received by this chairman. Scholarship Chairmen for GCNC, GCSC and VFGC submitted excellent candidates for our Region's financial assistance with their educational endeavors.

The SAR Scholarship of \$1,500 was awarded to Katherine Anderson Pollok of Durham, NC. Katie completed undergraduate studies at UNC Chapel Hill in 2016 in the School of Design, with a GPA of 4.0. She is presently enrolled for a Master of Landscape Architecture with a Certificate in Public Interest Design at NCSU in Raleigh. She again holds a 4.0 GPA.


Her objective after graduation in 2026 is to work in Public Park Design Using Native Plants. She will be equipped to design plant-centric spaces that enrich communities through native plantings and inclusive designs that address both humanitarian and environmental challenges. She has been recognized as a graduate assistant and successful grant writer: \$150,000 Grant to work with the NC State Park System, and \$100,000 Grant for work with the City of Durham Innovative Lab on an Urban Landscape. She is enthusiastic about connecting people to Nature.

Katie says that "NCSU has helped me to grow the necessary skills to continue fostering the connection between plants, humans and place. 
